BLACK HISTORY MONTH ART SHOW!




After a month of amazing work researching Black artists throughout history, our middle schoolers are proud to present their contribution to our Art Show!

One of three female artists and the only American officially associated with Impressionism, Mary Cassatt was also an invaluable adviser, helping introduce European art to major collectors in the United States. Her modern woman is expertly rendered in the 1878 painting In the Loge, the first Impressionist work the artist exhibited in the United States.

FAMOUS ARTIST OF THE WEEK

MEET JACQUELINE VALENZUELA

"I'm a first-gen Mexican-American. Growing up as a child of immigrants has definitely had an effect on my work. Since I grew up experiencing both American and Mexican culture; both sides have found their ways into my paintings.

I actually did not want to be an artist. I didn't even want to pursue a degree, but my English high school teacher scolded me for not considering applying to college. I decided to just apply last minute, took my SAT and filled out college applications. When the application asked me what degree I wanted to pursue I just picked art. Art had always interested me, but when I made that choice I did not really have anything in mind as far as what type of career I could make out of art."
