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BEEP, BOOP, BOOP, BOP! IT'S ROBOT WEEK!


K-2 scholars did some STEAM work this week by creating robots in a variety of ways! They collaged, drew, and did some printmaking by making collagraphs! Check it out!



GOT TEA?

IMMORAL MIMIC OR CONCEPTUAL CREATIVE?

Since we were very young, most people have learned from their elders that taking the work of others and claiming that it's your own is wrong. This is called plagarism, or appropriation in the art world.

Richard Prince is an artist who is known for appropriating the works of other people. In 2015, Prince "created" a whole series of photographs from other people's Instagram photos. Prince would comment on the photo in the app, screenshot the post with his comment underneath (and without permission from the photo's original owner), and then he would print and frame it as his own "original" photo. These are then sold in galleries for thousands of dollars.

So how did art critics, fellow artists, and the general population respond to this?

Thoughtfully. Some were outraged, sure. And the original owners of these photographs definitely attempted suing Richard, but the courts said that these photos are technically and legally his own. He took the screenshot of the original, so just like you or I taking a selfie in front of a painting in a museum, the resulting image is owned by the person who took that photo. Others thought Richard was a conceptual genius who forced the public to consider who really owns posted images in the age of social media and a truly world-wide web.

As a result, Richard Prince is not typically well-recieved in the art world, especially by the artists he rips off. He still manages to sell these printed images for thousands of dollars, because some people believe that his photos are conceptual works of genius. And that's the tea.
